

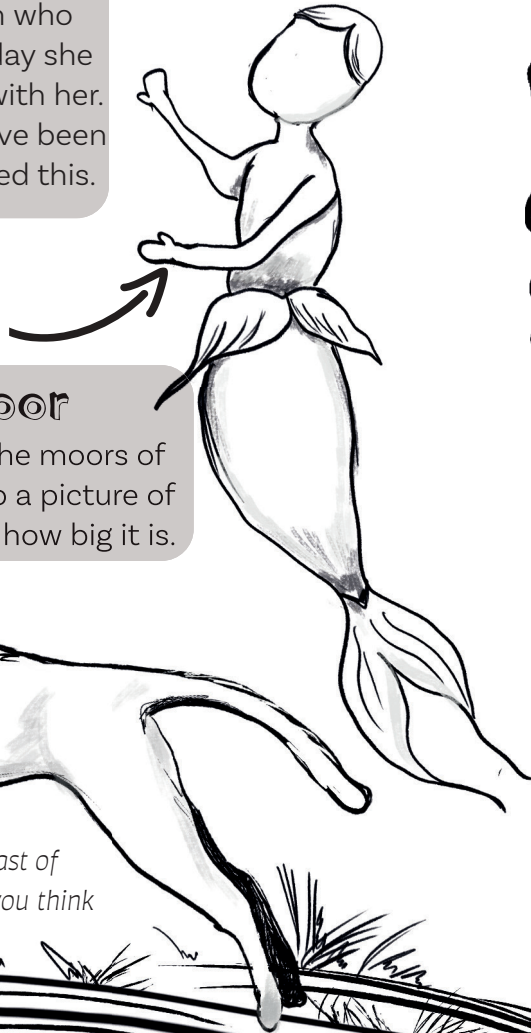
Stories of Cornwall

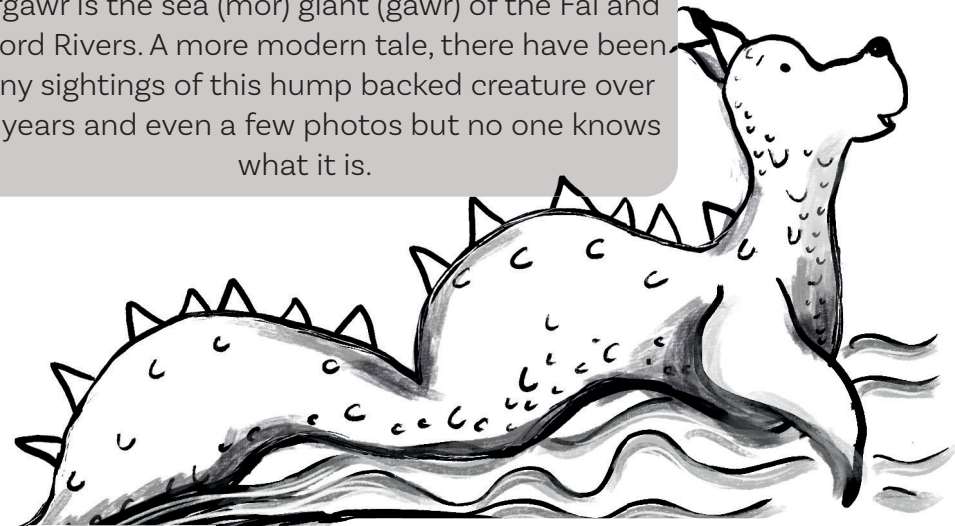
What is your favourite ice cream flavour?
